Pupil Premium: 2018-2019 – Final report with impact

Background:

The Pupil Premium is allocated to pupils from low-income families who are known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and pupils who have been 'looked after' continuously for more than six months (LAC). Funding also includes pupils eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (the Ever 6 FSM measure) and pupils from services families.

School are free to decide how they spend the Pupil Premium. We are, however, held accountable for how we have used the funding to support pupils from these families. We are required to publish online information about how we have used the Premium, ensuring that parents and others are made fully aware of the attainment of pupils covered by the Premium and the extra support that they receive.

Budget:

In the 2018-19 financial year the amount of Pupil Premium received was £82,615. We planned interventions and projects which were also supplemented from our delegated budget to ensure that we supported all of our most disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils.
