Chess Club - Starting after half term!


Chess Club will run for 5 weeks on the following dates:






Polite Reminder







Year 5 thoroughly enjoyed a trip to Winchester Science Museum last week to support their space topic and to learn more about space and forces. We enjoyed a workshop which explained how the James Webb Space Telescope worked using the physics related to absorbing or reflecting heat and use of mirrors to reflect light. After spending looking at the different science related exhibits, we sat back in Planetarium and learnt about constellations and the planets in our solar system. A visit to the gift shop was, of course, an added highlight! We had a great day out! We are very proud of the way they

represented the school and were so inquisative.







Design Technology and Art are often linked together. However, the starting points, emphasis, intentions and outcomes of pupils' learning differ between these two subjects and clarifying the differences is essential in securing the integrity of each subject's contribution.

In D&T, designing should always lead to a product or system that works in some way, is the output of a plan and has been designed to solve a specific problem for a particular group of people. Whereas art is generally understood as an activity done by people with a communicative or aesthetic purpose, something that expresses an idea or an emotion. At Northmead we teach these subjects independently of each other to ensure the distinct contribution of each is maintained.

Technical Knowledge

This year we are introducing symbols which we will share with the children as they work through their DT unit of work. This will help them to identify the key focus for the lesson

DT is a brilliant subject and one very many children get really excited about studying. It is a real cross curricular subject as children can use what they have learnt in maths or science and use that knowledge practically.

The National Curriculum for Design Technology states that there are four main skills that children should be taught to develop: Designing, Making, Evaluating and Technical Knowledge.

What is Iterative design?

Upon at regular points in order to improve and refine them to ensure they best meet the needs of the final user. This is the type secondary school.

We begin this type of approach with children by asking them to evaluate their products and suggest improvements.

- Why is art important in school?
- Making art is a natural behaviour. Humans have been creating art since the beginning of time. To create is to think, feel and communicate – we want to produce a generation of creative and innovative
- It enhances children's cognitive development which can have a positive effect on maths skills and other Art helps to develop children's motor skills and eye-hand coordination.
- - Evidence suggests that in 1 in around 12 people work in the creative industries, and the cultural and creative Art has a positive impact on mental health and wellbeing
 - Art moves people—inspiring children, inciting new questions and provoking curiosity, excitement, and
 - outrage. Children enjoy making art.


Over the course of their time at Northmead, your child will have opportunities to develop their skills across the disciplines of drawing, painting, collage, printing, 3D work, photography and textiles.
